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St Brigid's Catholic Primary School Gwynneville Reflection 2022

St Brigid's Catholic Parish Primary School is a one-stream school founded by the Sisters of the Good Samaritan in 1951. The school caters for students in years K-6 and has a current enrolment of approximately 200 students. Nestled in the foothills of Mt Keira we are approximately five kilometres from the large urban centre of Wollongong. Our students are generally drawn from our local village community and represent a variety of socio-economic and cultural backgrounds, which contributes to a good synergy and a strong sense of welcome and community.

Our school mission, "To Develop Leaders of Faith, Justice and Learning', along with our Catholic faith and our call to be stewards of creation, underpins our school culture and values. Being people of justice means that we work for justice for the earth and for the earth community. Our call is to listen with the ear of the heart to work for the common good and respond to our neighbour and all of creation with energy, loving generosity, and right relationships. For us leadership is being a positive influence for ourselves, others, and the world around us.

We are informed by the Benedictine charism of the sisters of the Good Samaritan which reminds us that all things are holy since they come from the hand of God and so we have a duty 'to cultivate and take care of' the good things of God's creation.

St Brigid's values and mission invite involvement in the wider community through its strong and extremely successful involvement in social justice and environmental issues, sports, and creative arts.

We consider a crucial aspect of our journey as being sustainable and responsible stewards caring for God's creation, our common home. In Pope Francis' encyclical document, Laudato Si', he highlights the important role that education plays: *There is nobility in the duty to care for creation through little daily actions, and it is wonderful how education can bring about real changes in lifestyle.*

This School Environmental Management Plan (SEMP) is a tool that will enable us to document, implement, reflect and celebrate environmental stewardship as we respond to the challenges from Laudato Si' to walk our own journey of ecological conversion. At St Brigid's we understand that we have a missionary and ecclesial mandate that impels us to participate and respond to the call to care for our common home with strategic planning, formation and concrete actions and it is within this context that this SEMP is formulated.

Developing leaders of faith, justice and learning

Since 2015 following the release of Laudato Si', St Brigid's Gwynneville has taken seriously Pope Francis' prophetic call for an ecological conversion and has proactively responded in a strategic, planned approach whereby sustainable practices and ecological values are promoted and supported across the system of schools in the Wollongong diocese.

Engagement with eco-spirituality, environmental education and action is a key component of our mission, of being Catholic and is viewed as "core business", not an "optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience" (LS n217)

This strategic approach has involved St Brigid's Gwynneville embedding ecological values into school programs and practices that promote an ecological and sustainable culture, encouraging everyone to live out his/her ecological vocation and engage in caring for our common home.

- St Brigid's Gwynneville follows the CEDoW Environmental Education Action Policy. Each year, every grade actively participates in writing and implementing a unit of work based upon the requirements of the Environmental Education Action Policy.
- St Brigid's Gwynneville has completed a School Environment Management Plan (SEMP 1). We have planned and are currently implementing the goals outlined in our SEMP 11 which began in 2021 and is ongoing until 2024.
- The staff at St Brigid's Gwynneville participated in the Staff Spirituality Day, *Who is My Neighbour.* Called to Ecological Conversion, led by Beth Riolo. This professional development will guide and inspire the staff towards living our ecological conversion.
- St Brigid's Gwynneville has planned, submitted, and received two CEDoW Environmental Education Grants
 - 2020 Subpod Composting Grow Beds
 - 2021 Djeera Bush Tucker Garden and Woolyungah Dry River Bed
- Cathy Cuff, a staff member of St Brigid's Gwynneville, is an active and current member of Wollongong Environment Network (WEN) that aims to support school communities respond to Laudato Si' and implement environmental stewardship and sustainability.
- St Brigid's Gwynneville has attained Level 3 Certification Catholic Earthcare Australia School. This a formal recognition by Earth Care Australia as an "a school certified as level 3 and is now committing to a whole school ecological change.
- St Brigid's Gwynneville is inspired by Australian Catholic Bishops' Social Justice Statement Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor and <u>Bishop Brian's Diocesan Pastoral Message</u>
- St Brigid's School connects the values of our school with the Laudato Si' Goals aims to provide programs and practices that care for our common home embedding within the school community a commitment to ecologically sustainable actions that promote and nurture ecological conversion.
