Overview

Catholic Education Diocese of Wollongong (CEDoW) was established in 1952 and serves Catholic systemic school communities across the four regions of the Illawarra, Macarthur, Southern Highlands and Shoalhaven. The traditional owners of the lands upon which our Catholic schools are built are the indigenous peoples of the Dharawal, Tharawal, Gundungurra and Yuin nations. To this day, our Catholic systemic schools are greatly influenced by the life and culture of Aboriginal

CEDoW is a vibrant learning community made up of **38 Catholic systemic schools** – 29 parish primary schools,8 secondary schools and 1 K-12 school – across the regions of the Illawarra. There are also eight independent Catholic schools administered by religious congregations within the Diocese (known as congregational schools) - seven secondary schools, and one K-12 school for students with special needs.

The leadership and strategic management of the Wollongong Catholic system of schools is the responsibility of the Director of Schools, who is in turn, responsible to the Bishop of Wollongong. The Director is accountable for the operation of the systemic schools, the management of the Catholic Education Office (CEO) and for providing creative leadership in the provision of resources, policy formation, strategic positioning and implementation processes in order to ensure the effectiveness of Catholic schools in the diocese. This role supports the evangelising mission of the Church in the diocese.

The Catholic Education Office Service Areas are as follows: Directorate Services; People and Culture; Finance, Facilities, ICLT & Planning; Catholic Life, Education and Mission Services; and School Improvement Services in Primary, Secondary and Specialist Support. Professional Officers, Education Officers, Support Teachers and Administrative Officers make up the Catholic Education Office workforce. These positions carry either office or school-based responsibility.

The Service Areas of the CEO are based across three locations – Marian Centre 86-88 Market Street Wollongong, The Annexe Wollongong and the Emmaus Centre Macarthur 5 Allman Street Campbelltown.

Rationale

CEDoW understands that Catholic Schools have a missionary and ecclesial mandate that impels them to listen to the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor. Engagement with eco-spirituality, environmental education and action is a key component of our mission, of being Catholic and is viewed as "core business", not an "optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience" (LS n217)

We are called to respond to the environmental crisis of the 21st Century by proactively engaging with Pope Francis' challenge from *Laudato Si'* for an ecological conversion. Since 2016 CEDoW has intentionally engaged in a strategic, planned approach whereby sustainable practices and ecological values are promoted and supported across the system of schools.

This involves schools embedding ecological values into school programs and practices that promote an ecological and sustainable culture that encourages everyone to live out his/her ecological vocation and engage in caring for our common home.

We are inspired by the Australian Catholic Bishops' Social Justice Statement (2021-2022) and Bishop Brian's Diocesan Pastoral Message (October 2021)
