Providence's Mission

The health of the environment and the health of its people are interconnected. Across Providence, we are witnessing melting glaciers, ravaging wildfires, and unprecedented flooding. The social determinants of health of the people we serve have multiplied, the social stressors exacerbated, and the traumas compounded by this ecological crisis. Their needs are now much higher and will only continue to increase. The ecological crisis is the result of a disconnection between humans in relationship with and responsibility towards God's Creation. As an organization and as individual caregivers, we are committed to care for all, especially the poor and vulnerable. Nature doesn't necessarily have a voice, so it's our responsibility to speak up; to be a voice for the vulnerable. We believe that care for humankind and care for the Earth must be carried out simultaneously.
