We are committed to increase awareness through activities that provide education to all, young and old alike, concerning care for the environment and the Poor. We will promote sustainable environmental practices and lifestyles. We will build community partnerships to increase the impact of environmental initiatives.

Our Parish, Most Blessed Sacrament (MBS) Church, A Catholic Community

Most Blessed Sacrament was formed in 1978 and is located in Arlington, Texas USA, in the middle of the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex. Our church has 4,027 total parishioners and 1,819 families. We are an active Catholic Community with over 75 ministries ([MBS Proclamation pg 4, 5](#)) that are supported by parishioners who volunteer their time in support of the parish, the community, and the underprivileged.

Caring for God's Creation, Laudato Si' Ministry at MBS

Caring for God's Creation ministry was announced to the MBS community on May 21, 2023. The ministry was formed to respond to the call of Pope Francis in his encyclical *Laudato Si' (Praise Be), On Care for Our Common Home* (2015). Our MBS parish responded. The first ministry meeting was on May 24, 2023, the 8th anniversary of *Laudato Si'*.



Laudato Si', On Care for Our Common Home


Laudato Si' is an encyclical of Pope Francis published in May 2015 addressed to all people of the world. His CALL is for us to take better care of the natural environment and all people, especially the poor. In order to

do this, he says we need to mend the relationship between God, each other, and the Earth. While *Laudato Si'* is the first encyclical to focus on the environment, its foundation rests in a long history of [Church teaching on creation](#).

Ministry Enrollment in the “[Laudato Si’ Action Platform](#)” (LSAP)

The Laudato Si’ Action Platform, LSAP, is a global initiative of the Vatican Dicastery (Department) for Promoting Integral Human Development.

The [LSAP website](#) is a shared online space that equips the Church to achieve solutions to the ecological crisis. LSAP supports participants in the development of tailored Laudato Si’ Action Plans to accomplish a single purpose: Concrete actions for each of the 7 Goals of LSAP to protect our common home and the people in the world.

2024 Accomplishments

- Created awareness of the importance of supporting biodiversity and the Monarch butterfly, the Texas state insect and an endangered species. Announcement examples:

The Monarch Butterfly, our TEXAS State Insect, is endangered. The Monarch Needs US!



The Monarch migrates through Texas in March and October. Their habitat is declining.

Arlington is helping the Monarch by creating Waystations to support reproduction (milkweed) and nutrition (native flowers).

Especially important is additional milkweed habitat.



2024 Accomplishments

1. Began process of achieving Energy Star Certification for MBS.



It was learned, through contacts with the North Texas Association of Energy Engineers (NTAEE), that our church could obtain an EPA Energy Star Rating and thus have a means of comparing our energy usage to similar worship facilities.

An Energy Star Account was established on November 11, 2024 and the electricity and Natural gas energy usage data collected for the previous 24 months was recorded. Further facility size and usage information is being gathered in 2025 for comparative purposes.

It is planned that the use and publicizing of an Energy Star rating will prompt more awareness of parishioners and community into a better understanding of their part in caring for the planet.

2. Ministry Members List Personal Actions Implemented to Practice Laudato Si'

Caring for God's Creation steering committee documented detailed actions we have personally taken to answer Pope Francis' call to take better care of our world and the people in it. It will be used to be a source of inspiration for others and was shared with Fr. Binoy.



3. LED lights were approved for installation in the church gymnasium.

A return on investment was developed for replacing LED lights, an energy saving and cost saving initiative. Parish approved.

The gym lights will be switched out in 2025. LED lights will be installed in phases throughout the parish, continuing over the next few years.



4. Power to Choose “Cut your home energy costs” event

“Power to Choose” is a State of Texas website that offers options to select energy providers that are low cost and offer 100% renewable energy. This was presented at an event in the parish hall after Mass on Sunday.

UTA Community Garden

In 2024 we paid for space in the UTA garden, when a lot becomes available. The half-acre garden supports Arlington's commitment to sustainability by preserving green space, educating the community about preserving green space and utilizes both compost and rain harvesting techniques to promote water conservation. A portion of all food grown here is donated to Mission Arlington, the garden's designated food bank program. The garden is a joint venture between [UTA's Office of Sustainability](#) and the City of Arlington's Parks and Recreation Department.




2024 Accomplishments: Save You Money

1. Created the Power to Choose" Cut your home energy costs" Parish Event.

2. Developed a return on investment for replacing LED lights, an energy saving and cost saving initiative. Parish approved.

The gym lights have been switched out. 3-month ROI (return on investment). LED lights will be installed in phases continuing the next few years.



3. Installed a bottle filler in the gym water fountain in Feb 2024.

Cost savings for both the parish and the parishioners. Neither needs to buy single use plastic water bottles!

2024 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1. Fountain Bottle Fillers Installed by Gym (Youth Group suggestion)

The addition of bottle fillers in the church was a suggestion from the Youth Group. They would prefer to use their existing water bottles, so they don't have to use single use plastic water bottles.

The bottle filler was installed February 2024. As of December 2024, we have saved **1,175 bottles!**

2. Initiated Plastic-Free in the MBS Kitchen

As we've learned more about the impact of plastics (from the Catholic Climate Covenant and other sources), especially single use plastics (!), we see an opportunity to both model and implement greener options in the MBS kitchen.

- The Bereavement Committee has made a commitment to discontinue single use plastic utensils, plates, and coffee stirrers.

Caring for God's Creation

Small pieces of plastic < 5mm in size

- Widespread in natural environment; found in oceans, rivers, rain, ice cores, plants, wild animals, the air we breathe
- Are swallowed by farm animals or fish who mistake them for food
- Effects of microplastics on humans is being studied
- Existing research on wildlife shows consumption of plastic particles severely damages their health—for example, neurotoxicity and intestinal deformities in fish.

Through our ministry members' participation in other ministries, we are laying the groundwork to promote sustainable options in the kitchen for upcoming events. Goals include:

- Discontinue use of Styrofoam cups.
- Use biodegradable options for cups and plates.
- Use washable plates and cups, stainless steel utensils, and use the sterilizing dish washer.
- Continue to research how to reduce food waste.




