

## **Personal Reflection on the Laudato Si' Goals and Ecological Commitment**

My mission is to continue helping nurture a way of life where wellness, faith, compassion, and care for creation belong together. I feel especially drawn to helping others rediscover this connection gently, through example, encouragement, and meaningful conversation.

I feel called to continue with the Laudato Si' Action Platform because it gives shared direction to values I have already been carrying in my heart for many years. It reminds me that even simple and humble actions are part of something larger when done with love and perseverance.

I believe ecological conversion becomes most meaningful when it is lived faithfully in ordinary life, where care for creation begins with how we choose to love, serve, and protect what has been entrusted to us.

This journey for me is still unfolding, but I trust that every sincere step toward caring for our common home is already part of the answer.

In this journey, I simply hope to remain faithful in nurturing life, protecting dignity, and caring for creation as a living expression of faith.
